Outcomes

The principal outcomes sought by FOMI are to:

- 1. Promote and enhance the scientific reserve on Mana Island and to ensure the continuance of the project by providing financial, material and physical support for the work on Mana Island.
- 2. Encourage and provide opportunities for persons and corporate bodies within New Zealand to take an active interest in all aspects of conservation on Mana Island.
- 3. Promote and heighten public awareness of the existence, role and activities of FOMI.

Outputs

The 2022 year has been a quiet year for FOMI – although some significant events have occurred. We have tried to continue as much of our work as possible given the limited access that we now have to the island.

Things have slowed down primarily as a result of the April 2021 loss of the services of the Knuckle Charters vessel Charmaine Karol to transport work parties and guided trips to the island. The vessel was sold in early 2022 to Glen and Vicky Cooper, who were enthusiastically promoting a new service under the GO MANA brand. Regrettably, in August they announced that they would be unable to continue with the service and placed the vessel on the market. This was a great disappointment to FOMI, Ngāti Toa, and DOC, who were all looking forward to the resumption of the great service provided by this vessel. We are resuming our search for a suitable boat to help, at least with work parties. Very limited access to the island for small groups is available using DOC's vessel.

Minister of Conservation Visit

In April 2022 FOMI was pleased to accept an invitation from the Minister of Conservation, Hon Kiritapu Allan, to join in the launch of Te Mana Te Taiao – Aotearoa New Zealand Biodiversity Strategy Implementation Plan. The plan builds on on Te Mana o te Taiao – the Aotearoa New Zealand Biodiversity Strategy which was released last year to set the direction for improving New Zealand's biodiversity over the next 30 years.

The Minister noted that Mana Island was chosen as an appropriate place for this launch owing to its spiritual and physical significance to New Zealand's biodiversity



journey. She noted that the history of Mana Island demonstrated what could be achieved for the mainland within a 30-year time frame through restoration activities involving DOC, tangata whenua, and community groups. She acknowledged how strategic decisions made over the past 30 years on the island have delivered great benefits for takahē, rowi, pāteke, kākāriki, lizards, and several seabird species, and that those benefits were accruing through DOC's partnership with Treaty Partner Ngāti Toa and community groups, especially Friends of Mana Island.

The Minister was accompanied by local MPs and representatives from DOC, MPI, Ministry for the Environment, Greater Wellington Regional Council, NZ Conservation Authority, Forest and Bird, and the media. The group was welcomed on to Mana by Ngāti Toa as tāngata whenua. Ngāti Toa CEO Helmut Modlik spoke about the significance of the occasion, their support for the principles of the plan, and how Ngāti Toa saw work on the island proceeding in the future.



FOMI President Dr John McKoy was also offered the opportunity to speak. He highlighted the role volunteer organisations make in supporting key stakeholders and welcomed the opportunity both to acknowledge the work on Mana Island over the last 30 years and to discuss future restoration strategy with stakeholders.

First White-faced Storm Petrels Return to the Island

Colin Miskelly and Annemieke Hendriks visited Mana Island for eight days in October to monitor seabird species and came back with good news. They reported the discovery of the first returnee white-faced storm petrels - from the 2019 and 2020 translocations.

Three white-faced storm petrels were found, from the 2019 and 2020 translocations. The two petrels in the picture were found together in the same burrow (one was translocated in 2019 and one in 2020). The third bird, discovered on the surface at night was also translocated in 2019. FOMI is pleased to see that the white-faced storm petrels are returning to Mana Island and hopes this trend continues. It is important to note that a subsequent visit in late November did not show any further sign of these birds.

Annemieke and Colin's main activity was recording the numbers of fluttering shearwaters and how many burrows contained eggs. Similar numbers to last year were seen despite a local fluttering shearwater "wreck" in the winter of 2022. They also took note of sooty shearwaters, diving petrels, and fairy prions. While on the island, Colin and Annemieke reviewed the flax weevil monitoring experiments, completed more 5-minute bird counts, and did a lot of weeding.



Working Party Visits Completed



A successful working party of 13 volunteers was completed in mid-June 2022 utilising the *Charmaine Karol*, the first such trip in 18 months. We managed another small working party trip travelling on DOC's vessel in early December. We have been advised that access to the island for working parties using this vessel is to be limited to 4 people every 2 months. In the context of past access this is constrained, and we will be seeking out other opportunities to extend our contribution to the restoration of Mana

Island in 2023.

Development of a

FOMI Work Plan

For the first time in several years in 2022 we developed a work plan for FOMI which we continue to talk to DOC about. Most of the agreed activities are dependent on suitable access to the island becoming available, so we continue to hope that we can improve access to the island soon.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

Friends of Mana Island Incorporated ("FOMI") has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual ("the Accrual Standard") on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that FOMI will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST.

Income Tax

FOMI is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax, having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank accounts and cash

The bank account in the Statement of Cash Flows is FOMI's operating bank account.

Changes in accounting policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies in the financial year (2021: nil).

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided for using the following rates:

Interest earned from term deposits and its operating account are accounted for on an accrual basis.

NOTE 1 OMV NEW ZEALAND LIMITED ("OMV") ONGOING PROJECTS

In a Sponsorship Letter Agreement dated, 5 December 2016, OMV agreed to fund a seabird dog survey in 2016, a fernbird translocation in 2019, and white-faced storm petrel translocations from 2018 to 2020 (subsequently extended to 2021). In a subsequent letter, dated 19 August 2018, OMV agreed to extend its offer of support to include a proposed wetland project planned for early 2019. The total GST exclusive grant of \$117,500 was to be paid by equal instalments of \$23,500 plus GST, spread over 5 years, commencing in 2016. The offers were gratefully accepted by FOMI, and all five instalments had been received by 31 December 2021.

NOTE 12 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

FOMI has a close working relationship with the Department of Conservation (DOC). It is a DOC requirement that any project or assistance provided by FOMI must first be approved by DOC.

As from 1 January 2022, costs incurred for transporting FOMI volunteers to Mana Island for maintenance purposes and/or special projects, are a DOC responsibility. It meets its responsibility by either providing a DOC vessel to transport the volunteers to and from the Island or, where FOMI engages a contractor, FOMI is fully reimbursed. In previous years costs were, in most instances, incurred by FOMI engaging a contractor and the costs shared between DOC and FOMI on a 50/50 basis.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT TO THE FRIENDS OF MANA ISLAND INC.

I have reviewed the financial statements of the Friends of Mana Island Inc. for the year ended 31 December 2022 in accordance with the Review Engagement Standards issued by the External Reporting Board.

The Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Statements.

The committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements and for such internal control as the committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The Assurance Reviewer's Responsibility.

My responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements. I conducted my review in accordance with International Standard on Review Engagements (New Zealand) ISRE (NZ) 2400. This Standard also requires I comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review is limited primarily to enquiries of the entity's personnel and analytical review procedures applied to financial data and thus provides less assurance than an audit. I have not performed an audit and, accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion.

Based on my review, nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the accompanying financial statements do not give a true and fair view.
